Simple Subjects and Predicates

Every sentence needs both a subject and a predicate. The **subject** tells whom or what the sentence is about. The **predicate** tells what the subject is or does or what happens to the subject. The **simple subject** is the key word or words in the complete subject. The **simple predicate** is the verb or verb phrase that tells something about the subject.
